

The History of the Titanic Year 2 Assembly

The entire assembly gathered in the hall to witness a presentation by Year 2 pupils, who had spent the term delving into the history of the Titanic. Taking us back to the year 1912, they recounted the harrowing tale of the Titanic's ill-fated maiden voyage, a voyage that left an indelible mark on history.

Constructed in Belfast, Ireland, the Titanic took three years to build and boasted a capacity of 3300 passengers. Departing from Southampton on April 10 1912, the ship carried 2240 passengers and crew. Bound for America, the Titanic accommodated families seeking a new life and others eager to experience the grandeur of the world's largest and most opulent ship.

First-class tickets, priced at up to £870, equivalent to £80,000 today, granted passengers access to lavish amenities such as a heated swimming pool, squash court, restaurants, and a music room. Meanwhile, the 1000 third-class passengers were provided with simple bunk beds and a large dining room for evening entertainment, complete with a piano. On the bridge, Captain Smith and his crew observed icebergs but failed to reduce speed. Despite reports from the radio operator warning of icebergs in their path, Captain Smith ordered a course adjustment and instructed the crew to remain vigilant for obstacles.

On April 14, after four days at sea, the Titanic struck an iceberg. As the ship began to sink, passengers and crew collaborated to evacuate, lowering lifeboats into the water and scrambling for safety. The principle of "women and children first" was upheld, yet the scarcity of lifeboats left many questioning whether there were enough for all aboard.

Tragically, 1500 lives were lost on that fateful night. However, amidst the despair, tales of heroism and resilience emerged. Passengers and crew united in their efforts to aid one another, emphasizing the importance of courage, cooperation, and resilience in the face of adversity. The story of the Titanic serves as a poignant reminder, prompting us to honour the memory of those who sailed aboard by preserving their stories and the lessons they impart.










Year 3 Ancient Greeks Workshop

Year 3 were delighted to enjoy an Ancient Greece workshop presented by Catherine Hammond from Epping Forest District Museum. The children were given artefacts and considered what these objects could tells us about Ancient Greek fashion and life, it also let us consider what facts that these artefacts could not answer. The children were very engaged and asked really interesting questions that helped them to think about what life for the Ancient Greeks could be like.

We felt that it was very important for the Greeks to be well dressed and that they were probably wealthy and powerful, able to afford jewellery. We also realised that the images on the artefacts did not show us how the poor of Ancient Greek were represented. The workshop was very intriguing and really made us think about what we were investigating and considering. We felt that the Gods were one of the most/important thing to them, nearly as much as looking beautiful.

Everyone thanked Catherine for her time and for the wonderful way she made us consider how we could better understand the Ancient Greeks.

Year 3 at Epping Field Study Centre

On Thursday 6 June, Year 3 visited the Epping Field Study Centre to take part in a teamwork and communication survival day. Before Year 3 could set off into Epping Forest, the instructors at the field centre wanted to ensure that everyone could read and understand how to follow the bearing points of a compass. The children listened very carefully and understood that once a compass bearing had been plotted, they would identify an unmoving landmark and proceed ahead. Once we had mastered this important survival skill, we set off in our groups and used our compasses to follow the signed route that our instructors had set, then unscrambled the anagram of letters found at each sign-post. Nobody got lost!

After lunch, we were given a scavenger list of items to find from the forest floor. Finally, the children worked together and communicated in teams to build a den. Once constructed each team told the class what features their den had, and discussed what improvements they would have made if they had more time. The instructors were very impressed by the dens made and how everyone communicated with each other. Miss Gilbert and Mrs. Biddle were delighted that the children had such a marvellous day and how well they listened and communicated with each other and the instructors - well done, Year 3!
