


### Infants

### Year 1 Learning about England and Hannukah

Year 1 have started drawing and painting flags for the different countries that make up the United Kingdom in their Computing lessons. They have been learning more facts about England such as the famous landmarks in London and traditions such as an afternoon tea. They learnt how to bake scones and enjoyed taste testing them with strawberry jam.

In their RE lessons the children have been learning about the Jewish festival of light. One of the Year 1 parents spoke to the children about Hannukah. She showed them a menorah, talked about the foods eaten and explained the meaning of the words on the dreidel. The children asked her some very interesting questions and how to play a game with the dreidel including winning gold coins in this game. After the talk, the children enjoyed decorating their own mini dreidels.

On Monday 20 January Year 2 had a wonderful trip to the Royal Gunpowder Mills. The classes learnt all about gunpowder and also had time to build their very own rockets and were able to fire them too.

### **Years 7&8 Visit the British Library**

We split into three groups and travelled on the London Underground to Kings Cross. We were greeted at the British Library by our tour guides. We entered the Medieval Women exhibition and used our worksheets to explore the private lives, public lives and spiritual lives of famous and not so famous women of the period. Key highlights included:

- The Book of the Queen by Christine de Pizan: The first professional woman author in ٠ Europe.
- The earliest known example of Joan of Arc's signature, never previously displayed outside ٠ of France.
- Julian of Norwich's The Revelations of Divine Love: the first work in English definity authored by a woman.
- On Women's Cosmetics: a recipe book likely to have been composed in Southern Italy in ٠ the 12th century with recipes for hair dye remover, face creams and breath freshener.

When the tours finished, we explored the gift shop, making some interesting purchases. We all had so much fun and are very grateful to Miss Long for organising such an interesting trip.

### Speak Out - Stay Safe NSPCC Assembly

Coopersale Hall School is proud to participate in the NSPCC's Speak Out Stay Safe programme, which aims to help children understand abuse in all its forms and teach them that they do not have to face their worries and struggles alone.

Each class took part in a virtual assembly led by NSPCC representatives. The sessions explored the steps children can take to share their concerns with a trusted adult, either within or outside of school. The virtual assemblies were intentionally paused at various points to encourage discussion, allowing children to reflect on and engage with the important messages being presented. Additionally, the assemblies provided guidance on contacting Childline and explained how Childline counsellors support children in alleviating their fears, worries, and concerns.

These virtual assemblies are an effective tool for reinforcing key safeguarding principles, empowering children to speak out and stay safe. At Coopersale Hall School, we are deeply committed to safeguarding the well-being of every child in our care, ensuring they feel safe, secure, and happy in their learning environment.
